

Currently Cori is an instructor at the Enowkin Centre for the National Aboriginal Professional Arts Training Program. She is also currently completing her second assignment as a Graduate Teachers Assistant at UBCO. She is a former graduate of UVIC, En'owkin and UBCO.

Cori's artistic subjects reflect her strong cultural heritage living close to the land taught by her maternal family whom are affluent knowledge keepers. Being a performance major her MFA project thesis work has been based upon the Captikwl (traditional oral stories) recorded by Mourning Dove (her maternal Great-Great Grandmother) first published Native American author of Coyote Stories in 1933. Cori has presented her work internationally and locally. Most recently she won the Kelowna Chamber of Commerce Top 40 over 40 Award for Business Excellence. She is one of the few female Eagle Dancers in North America which she has shared her dance internationally in Peru and France.

Richard Armstrong, from the Penticton Indian Band and member of the Syilx Nation of the Okanagan Valley within B.C.'s Southern Interior is one of the nation's fluent speakers and Traditional Ecological Knowledge keepers.

Immersed in the Syilx Language and Culture as a child, he aims to assist those who need his help as his teachers and teachings have helped him, therefore he shares who he is and what he has learned with Okanagan Nation, its community and welcomed guests. He is a teacher of the Nsyilxcen Language and Culture at both the En'owkin Centre and University of British Columbia – Okanagan.

Through the use of Captikwl (Okanagan Legends) he shares lessons learned though individual interpretation. This allows all ages to gain insight to self-awareness like "I get it", connecting to one's own experience. Through this form of learning fundamental lessons, is how we are all connected. Richard is the primary TEK specialist who works very closely with partner organizations in the restoration and monitoring activities at ECOmmunity Place and in the Syilx Territory.

He is a leader in the language and cultural revitalization for the Nsyilxcen speaking people and understand the importance of collaborating with like-minded individuals on all levels.



Jeanette is fluent in the Okanagan Language from a very young age. She was taught by her Grandparents and her mother. She currently resides in Omak Washington.




KAREN TERBASKET

Marlowe has a B.A. Major in Indigenous Studies and M.A. and Ph.D. Interdisciplinary Studies from the University of B.C. Okanagan.




